

New Hope Community marks its 45th anniversary in 2020. Starting as a forprofit private school for people with developmental disabilities on the site of an old Catskill hotel and evolving into a nonprofit organization that offers a myriad of residential, employment, day habilitation and community-based opportunities, is nothing

short of incredible. It is simply amazing what determined minds and spirits can achieve when believing in a common purpose and goal!

In this FOCUS edition, our New Hope Community President and Board Chair share exciting updates on several projects, initiatives and accomplishments. I trust you won't mind if I take this opportunity to add to our story with some thoughts from my heart.

I have now been the CEO of New Hope Community for 1½ years and I have learned so much about our wonderful organization. Helping people live their best life is what drives us each day. The beautiful layers of New Hope encompass our dedicated staff and reach beyond into our valued community. Our collective efforts form one energized and enlivened force that works to create and sustain synergies that challenge, support and broaden the lives of all those who have chosen to be part of our New Hope family.

Achieving this goal requires transparency, accountability, advocacy, vision, openness, communication, collaboration, competency and much more. New Hope is working diligently to fuel practices and processes that dynamically support a culture that allows the realization of such positioning. However, we recognize that we are a work in progress and welcome your input and involvement as we strive to become all we can be.

We also are building bridges within and throughout our community that speak to existing needs and give testament to our determination to build social capital and expand our community presence. People with developmental disabilities have yet to achieve full acceptance within our society. Few are offered roles of social value (to include gainful employment opportunities) and much more needs to be achieved as we strive to celebrate the unique and very beautiful value each person, who happens to have a disability, brings into our communal life experience. We are part of a "neighborhood" beyond ourselves and understand the importance of being neighborly, of working together, of lifting up those in need and ultimately celebrating a higher realm of possibilities and acceptance.

It gives me great pleasure to share the news of our merger with Select Human Services, Inc. on January 1, 2020. This merger is pivotal to extending the reach and diversification of our supports and services and will be a catalyst for dynamic change. On another front, this Spring we commence as a clinical site for SUNY Sullivan's nursing program and will be supporting the knowledge base and clinical skills of our future nursing workforce specific to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. This is a most meaningful step in the delivery of increasingly holistic and informed health care. In addition, New Hope Community is partnering with the college to roll-out a Direct Support Professional (DSP) credentialing program within the next academic year which will support an enhanced level of expertise for our DSPs – staff who drive the quality of our direct supports and services - 24/7. To round it all out, we are participating in collaborative projects throughout the state that involve groundbreaking I/DD research which will ultimately advance our understanding and positioning as we continually seek to enhance the life experience of all those whom we support.

As we endeavor to grow, change and evolve, we ask that you join us. Our "Learn it, Lead it, Live it" initiative has become the "Family and Friends Network" and everyone who cares about and connects to New Hope Community is organically a part of this network. Your wisdom, your time, your financial support, is critical to our progress. We are making a difference, together, and we will continue to do so in ever-increasing ways.

I trust you sense the promise our future holds. New Hope Community - 45 years old and journeying forward – is unified, strong and poised for positive change.

In closing, I could never ask for a better role or purpose. I extend my heartfelt thanks to an incredibly competent, dedicated and supportive management team, staffing team and our community and foundation Board chairs and Boards. Their talent and support guide New Hope's path and fan the flames of our collective passion. I am delighted to see the growth of empowering, hands-on programs like our Hope Farm, created in collaboration with SUNY Sullivan, and our WithOut Walls enrichment program. We're reaching out to lend a helping hand to our local Head Start programs, provide farm-fresh produce and assistance for food banks, and are welcoming various community groups to our facilities to get to know each other better. The successes of programs like these encourage us to think bigger, broader and forge new partnerships enabling individuals to be active and engaged in the community around us.

Our merger with Select Human Services, Inc. on January 1, 2020 is great news -- another way we are enhancing our partnerships with other high caliber, community-focused organizations. Founded by New Hope Community CEO Debra McGinness prior to her joining New Hope Community, Select Human Services has provided life-enhancing, community-based supports and services hundreds of individuals and families in Westchester and the Hudson Valley for the past decade. This merger gives us greater reach to assist individuals who live at home and can most certainly benefit from our wide array of services.

Other exciting partnerships are in the works to promote greater inclusivity, and contribute to a more diverse community. Our new Sensory Garden, slated to open this summer, will be a welcomed place for all to come to refresh and relax. We've broken ground on Compass Pointe Living, a new, public/private collaboration for enriched living for men and women with I/DD and their families. This prototype preserves family connectivity, allows for assimilation with other residents in the community and provides supports for parents as they age. Through another pivotal partnership, we will welcome students from BOCES for transition planning as they age out of their school-based services.

Here at New Hope, we are great collaborators and through our extensive staff training, we focus on person-centered services to ensure individual choice, quality and efficiency. This has earned us the Person-Centered Excellence Accreditation from the Council on Quality and Leadership (CQL) a prestigious, four-year award that has been a focal point for us, and we are optimistic that our hard work will be recognized once again.

In 2020, we will continue to invest in successful programs such as our Supported Employment Program, which matches dedicated New Hope workers with the practical responsibilities of a job at a local business within the community. The feedback we have received from employers over the past two decades has been outstanding, and we are thrilled to see new businesses also express an interest in hiring our dedicated employees.

I feel fortunate to have an increasingly talented Board and management team working in concert to guide our strategic initiatives. It all starts with New Hope's pragmatic leadership in CEO Debra McGinness and President Bhakar Singh. We rely on our deeply committed Board for their expertise, with officers Lori Stroh, Vice Chair; Brianne Goldstein, Secretary, and Marianne Goldman, Treasurer. In 2019, we added our newest member, Steve Skillman, who brings to the role investment management experience and fresh perspectives.

Great things are happening at New Hope Community and I am honored to play a role in fulfilling the dreams of the individuals and families we serve. On behalf of the Board of Directors, thank you for your valued support of our mission.

Enriching Lives With Imaginative Opportunities

A Message from **Bhakar Singh**, President



Over the past decade, a whirlwind of regulatory changes and industry-wide challenges have affected services for people with I/DD. New Hope Community has stepped up to the plate to address these concerns by introducing several exciting initiatives and innovative partnerships that are giving individuals and families even more choices.

We have stayed ahead of the curve in our strategic planning through our creative and holistic approach to address issues such as:

- The increased need for diverse housing/living arrangements based on changing preferences and desires of people with I/DD and their families
- An increasing emphasis on community-based services and self-direction
- New workforce requirements and restrictions
- The anticipated move to managed care and value-based care

We are committed more than ever to providing authentic opportunities to learn, grow and live within the broader community. This is especially important for individuals who are living at home and receiving limited supports through community habilitation or respite services. Families often struggle with a huge burden of either finding the right staff, back-up staff or a safety-net especially as they age or their circumstances change.

The ongoing challenge of finding suitable housing has been a constant and universal concern for both families and human services professionals who support them. Over the years, we have made great strides to establish a variety of group residential settings to meet individualized needs. This process has been even more difficult due to a new phenomenon – vacancies in residential group homes resulting from New York State's practice of reserving priority placement in homes for individuals who have significant behavioral and other clinical needs. We have already seen this create a "mismatch" in the dynamic of some of our homes and our residential teams are working harder than ever to manage the delicate balance of lifestyles and personalities with our housing inventory. While unwarranted vacancies for housing are occurring in increasing numbers at Individualized Residential Alternatives (IRAs) across the state, we, at New Hope, have introduced a very exciting community living solution that is both attractive and affordable for people who wish to live more independently.

Recognizing there is an unmet opportunity for people with disabilities to live their dream life in a place of their own, we have devised an exciting, ground-breaking model as a

pilot program – a public/private collaboration to create a blended apartment complex open to people from all walks of life in the community. Working with an established developer, we will unveil in Spring 2021, Compass Pointe Living, in Monticello, NY. This 63-unit rental apartment community will offer universal accessibility and modern conveniences along with on-site support and direct access to New Hope Community staff and programs. This once-in-a-lifetime opportunity allows families to rent their own apartment units in the same complex as their loved ones, fostering family connections yet still providing the freedom to live on their own. Parents who reside at Compass Pointe Living may also have peace of mind knowing they, too, have access to the same amenities and universally accessible community that their loved one will enjoy.

We recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Sullivan BOCES to offer transition planning for students that will provide complementary services not offered at schools such as respite and community habilitation, and expand on their skills and learning, as well as help them transition out of high school into the workforce. In 2020, we also will be opening a community center in Liberty, NY, to work with groups in the community looking to partner on literacy programs, a repair café and create a home base for our popular WithOut Walls program.

Throughout our organization, we see indications of our creative solutions at work. Technology and adaptive equipment are being used in ways we would have never imagined even just a few years ago, to unlock communication and empower individuals to engage more fully. We have begun to introduce sensory rooms in our residences and plans are underway for our inviting and relaxing Sensory Garden coming to our main campus in Spring 2021. Our hands-on enrichment activities like the popular WithOut Walls program and our amazing Hope Farm encourage our participants to fine-tune their tactile, motor and social skills, as well as explore the world around them.

And, we are looking at ways to make small but impactful improvements such as our partnership with a local pharmacy to improve pharmacy delivery systems – to make it easier for people to self-adminster their prescribed medications.

With an eye toward the future, our Board of Directors and management are working to find ways to improve our successes and enhance services to enrich the lives of the individuals and families we serve. While this work never ends, I am pleased to report that we have remained ahead of the curve, poised to meet any challenges that come our way. I thank you for your continuing support as we venture into 2020 together.

Recently, ground was broken on the Monticello, NY property that will be transformed into an attractive apartment complex. The units will be fully integrated and accessible for people with disabilities and also be a highly desirable rental community for others in the community.

Within this customized community, Compass Pointe Living balances health and enrichment with independence and aspiration.

The complex will consist of three, three-story buildings that house a total of 63 one and two bedroom apartments. All apartments feature smart technology compatibility and are ADA compliant. Approximately 25% of the apartments are set aside for occupancy of people with I/DD. This inclusive residential living is based upon principles of community with the safety and services of a 24-hour support network. All apartments will be available at fair market value to the families of loved ones, general public and would be appealing choices for workforce housing, seniors and students.

The project, which is expected to be completed Spring 2021, is likely to be the first of many to bring unique, integrated apartment living and a holistic lifestyle for all in the community.










Sensory Garden




showed their appreciation by signing a large card.




Although Nurses Week is a designated time to thank our nurses, New Hope Community appreciates the dedication, commitment and selflessness of our nursing staff every day.

Thank you to everyone who helped make this year's party a great success!








Memorandums of Understanding



New Hope Community continues its reach throughout Sullivan County to expand community partnerships and collaborations with our neighbors.

In October, New Hope Community signed a Memorandum of Understanding with SUNY Sullivan to become a clinical site for their nursing program beginning in





the 2019 academic year. Research shows that undergraduate and post-graduate nursing education programs provide minimal instruction and clinical experience specific to caring for patients with I/DD.

This is an important step in supporting future nurses with a knowledge base and skill set that will support I/DD training opportunities and expand the optimal health and positive health care experience for people with I/DD.

We have also created a process that enables us to welcome both volunteers and interns to New Hope Community. We recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Sullivan County's BOCES program to work with their students and expand their exposure to and understanding of people with I/DD — our New Hope family.



CQL Re-Accreditation

We are excited to announce that we successfully earned our Person-Centered Excellence re-accreditation with The Council on Quality and Leadership and are looking forward to another four-year partnership. In CQL's own words, accreditation is important because, "Through an open, honest, and unbiased evaluation by outside experts, accreditation equips organizations with valuable information and action steps for improvement." Our accreditation wasn't about passing a test, but about participating in a process that will bring about systemic, person-centered transformation.

Recently, we received approval for our short-term plans that will align with our mission statement of challenging ourselves to enhance the lives of people with intellectual and other disabilities. Stay tuned for more specifics on those plans and the positive impact they will have on the organization and those whom we support.



Neighbor to Neighbor



New Hope Community believes in giving back to the community and dedicating efforts to the building of community networks and partnerships that improve the lives of all involved. It's about building social capital with the understanding that each community member's wellbeing is shaped by that of another. We are strongest, healthiest and most productive when working together.



Through strong partnerships with civic organizations, area employers and educational institutions, such as SUNY Sullivan and Sullivan BOCES, New Hope Community also creates countless opportunities for the men and women of NHC to support dynamic programs, projects and initiatives within Sullivan County.



New Hope hosted their 2nd Annual Holiday Family Dinner on December 10th and, once again, partnered with Officer Edwards for the annual Fallsburg PBA Toy Drive Giveaway. This year, NHC volunteers dished up 541 hot meals prepared by the Community Bistro and served them with a smile to Sullivan County families. Each child received a gift from Santa and his elves. Several generous companies donated items which added



to the festivities, including: Ideal Snacks Corporation, Freskeeto Frozen Foods, Inc. and I Zakarin & Sons Paper, Inc.



Through its ongoing relationship with Sullivan County Head Start (SCHS), in Woodbourne, NY, New Hope Community volunteers and staff members also "adopted" 93 children for the holidays, providing nearly 300 wrapped gifts from the children's personal wish lists. Earlier in the year, costumed staff and individuals from NHC hosted a Halloween trick or treating event for 160 Head Start children in NHC's main building. NHC also contributed funds to help support Head Start's clinical and programming services to children and their parents.



New Hope Community also recognizes first responders at local fire and rescue departments and contributes time, food and dollars to local food pantries and community nutritional programs.



This past Thanksgiving, NHC made possible the distribution of 100 meals through the Church of the Immaculate Conception in Fallsburg, NY and additionally contributed funds benefiting the Federation for the Homeless in Monticello and St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in South Fallsburg. NHC also provided provisions for the SUNY Sullivan Food Pantry which assists students who are unable to afford standard meal plans. And, the Community Bistro, in conjunction with their Day Habilitation Program participants prepared enough soup to feed approximately 3,240 local people in need over a threemonth period in support of the Sullivan County



Community Lunch program. Each growing season, New Hope Community's sustainable Hope Farm donates fresh produce grown



and harvested by those supported at NHC, to area residents who face nutritional hardships. By sharing the fruits of their labor, those working at Hope Farm – some of whom rely on special off-road wheelchairs to navigate the terrain – can alleviate hunger and support nutritional health within their community.



New Hope Community has been a part of this community for more than 40 years, and our neighbors are our extended family.



It is a real privilege to be able to demonstrate our commitment to our community. We all need to support one another in ways that collectively lift us up and bring us together.
