One day, after announcing the purchase of the Trackchairs, I was sitting in my office when a person we support who uses a wheelchair stopped by just to say thank you for bringing this opportunity to the people we support to be more deeply engaged in our programming at Hope Farm and to go new places. Sometimes, when work gets busy, it can be easy to just keep moving down the task list; his visit to say thank you reminded me of the impact our community has on peoples' lives. He brought life back into the process and purpose back into the work going into the project. He reminded me to pause to remember the purpose and appreciate the process.

How Do You Manage Your Time:

With intention and flexibility. My days are full and fast-paced, so I rely on prioritization, creative thinking, and belief that this meaningful work happens when you lead with purpose, not perfection. I am no expert at this, but I have an incredible team to collaborate with; and together we listen, prioritize and plan, and continue to evolve and grow and make things happen.

What Advice Do You Have for Someone Entering Your Field: Stay curious. Listen more than you speak. Fundraising isn't about transactions; it's about relationships. Care deeply, stay authentic, and believe in the mission you represent.
